

Male Involvement Talking Points

Father-child interaction has been shown to promote a child's physical well-being, perceptual abilities, and competency for relatedness with others, even at a young age.

(Krampe and Fairweather, 1993, *Father Presence and Family Formation*)

When both boys and girls are reared with engaged fathers they demonstrate a "greater ability to take initiative and evidence self-control".

Sons of nurturing fathers are more likely to model their fathers and internalize their modes of thinking and problem solving.

A close and warm relationship with Dad fosters a daughter's sense of competence, especially in math, and a secure sense of femininity.

Even very young children whose fathers are involved show increased curiosity in the world around them and greater confidence in their ability to solve problems.

Fathers teach children to regulate their emotions. Fathers who are play partners have kids more adept at reading emotional signals as well as kids who are better at sending clear emotional signals you can recognize.

The most important factor of all in developing empathy is paternal involvement in child care.

When fathers are engaged in their children's lives, their children profit showing greater self-esteem, higher intellectual achievement, more secure identity, and a greater chance of success in life.

Boys experience the positive aspects of being a male, while girls experience healthy male guidance when exposed to an involved father.

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
